What does Psalm 137 show us?

- ▶ It shows us the emotional authenticity of the Bible.

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- ▶ It shows us the redemptive power of righteous anger.

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Anger: the emotional means we use to recover what we have lost.

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Before we act our anger,
we should pray our anger.

To ask God to remember is to ask God to act

"At a church service in Munich where I was speaking I saw him. The former SS man who had stood at the so-called shower room door at the processing center at Ravensbrook. With the other guards he had often run his hands over the naked bodies as they walked by and responded callously to requests for help. ...

He was the first of our actual jailers that I had ever seen after the war, and suddenly it was all there again: the heaps of clothing, Besty's pained, blanched face, and after the church service he came up to me and said, "How grateful I am for your message, Fraulein! To think, that as you say, He has washed away my sins." His hand was thrust out to ...

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... shake mine, but my hand stayed at my side. Angry, vengeful thoughts boiled through me. I tried to smile, I struggled to raise my hand, but I could not. I silently prayed, "Jesus, I cannot forgive him; give me your forgiveness," and as I took his hand, the most incredible thing happened: from my shoulder, along my arm and through my hand, a current seemed to pass, while into my heart sprang a love for this stranger that almost overwhelmed me."

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
